

A Tribute to Lorraine Harriott

As it says on the the school website, Froxfield CE Primary and Preschool is a small school that believes in being a close-knit community of individuals. Tragically on Friday 16th January the school suffered the very sad loss of a greatly loved member of our community; our dear colleague and friend, Lorraine Harriott, died suddenly after a very short illness. Lorraine, Mrs Harriott, had taught class 4 for ten years until July 2021 when she retired after a 39 year long career in teaching and she leaves a huge legacy of the wonderful positive impact she had on the generations of children who were lucky enough to have been taught by her.

I first met Lorraine in 2018 when I joined the school as a governor. As well as teaching class 4, Lorraine was also the staff governor, the senior teacher and the Maths lead in the school. She was so warm and welcoming to me and I was surprised when she recruited me to be the Maths Governor, but with her encouragement I developed the confidence I needed to oversee this key subject and I will always be grateful to her for taking me under her wing. From all that follows below from Lorraine's colleagues, governors; parents and perhaps most importantly of all, from children, giving others the confidence and encouragement to grow and to shine was the gift that Lorraine gave us all. those beyond our parish.

Vickie Farrow the Head Teacher has written: "Lorraine was all about the children. She loved being with them and valued their uniqueness. Children couldn't wait to be in her class. She was kind, compassionate, caring, and made learning fun for them. She really took the time to know every child as an individual and understand what made them tick. Nothing was ever too much for her and she would do anything for anyone. She truly shaped the lives of so many children over her career and her legacy will live on through them."

Emily Vickery, who was Lorraine's Teaching Assistant wrote: "There are some people in life who were meant to be teachers and Lorraine was one of them.Lorraine really was special; children instantly felt safe, happy and valued with her. Her passion was that every child mattered and she made them feel like they could do anything. How many teachers would get their year 6 pupils standing on chairs shouting 'I am brilliant'.

I have watched in awe as she has helped children with no self esteem leave primary school ready to conquer. Her legacy is to all those children who without her would not have had self belief, she simply was a credit to her profession. Education is not just about academics, it is leaving school believing you have much to offer this world and you matter and that's what Lorraine did for all her students in her care. Her light continues to shine in all those children she has helped over the years. It was a privilege to have worked with her and more importantly call her my friend."

Lorraine joined Froxfield School just before it returned to being a full primary and Graham Meredith who was the chair of governors at that time remembers:

"Lorraine's contribution to the 'restoration' of the school was crucial and she brought invaluable experience which she offered so tactfully and successfully at a time when things could so easily have gone wrong; and she had the reward of seeing the school's success."

Edward Sadler the current vice chair of governors wrote: Lorraine was, so to speak, in the prime of her retirement, and, I am sure, loving her time as a grandmother. The staff will be shocked and saddened as she was such a big part of the school as it grew to primary status. And there will be generations of children who will remember her with great affection and respect - one of those teachers who you always remember and have a formative influence on your life.

Rebecca Labram, whose son Ben was taught by Mrs Harriott has written: "For parents, Mrs Harriott was a source of wisdom, support and good advice. She took the time to know all her students and cared deeply about every one. To her students she was simply a wonderful teacher; kind, inspirational, and full of fun! She was always encouraging them to do their best, to believe in themselves, to be curious and to love learning. She taught them resilience to navigate the big changes as they made the step from primary to secondary school. In retirement she continued to tutor and inspire students, including Ben. She made a huge difference to our family. We are devastated to lose her and we will miss her very much. "

In conclusion I leave it to two children who have written the following: Phoebe:

I think when I say this, I speak for every child who was lucky enough to have been taught by Mrs Harriott. She was such an incredible person and will be hugely missed by so many people. Not only was she a wonderful teacher but an inspiring role model to all of the children she taught over the years. I wish I could thank her for everything she did for me as she really did make me the person I am today. No one made me laugh like Mrs Harriott and her legend will live on forever.

Mrs Harriott was as great a teacher as a person. The years I spent in her class were my best. She made everyone feel safe, happy and heard, giving us all a proper chance to feel confident in our own abilities. She was humorous with 'Worst Joke Wednesday', I remember spending my weekends finding jokes that would make her laugh as much as she did me. Other weekends were spent searching for different ways to say 'good morning' in another language, just so I could make her proud. She always celebrated our achievements even if they weren't big to us, because they were to her.

She taught us in ways she knew were effective and I've carried that with me year after year, and I know I will forever. Leaving her class and starting secondary school was emotional but I knew to move forward with my head held high, just as she wanted. Every time I got a question right she was so, immensely proud, and her smile was so contagious that I couldn't help but feel proud too. Mrs Harriott had guided me through so much, whether she knew it or not, and inspired me to be who I am today, I know she will continue to throughout my life. She was a wonderful woman, she brought so much light to so many lives, including my own. After all the time I've known her, I really just want to say thank you so, so much. Thank you for everything. With all my love, Anya x

Bridget Kindler



Bridget Kindler, of Filmore Hill, Privett, died shortly before Christmas after a very brief illness. Her unexpected death was both a shock and a great sadness, and is a real loss not only to her family and immediate neighbours in Privett, but to the whole village community, which Bridget supported over many years, tirelessly and with great devotion.

Bridget and John Kindler lived in Privett for many years, and their children, Tod and Kate, were born and raised in the village. John died in 2015, and Bridget's response to his sudden and early death was to re-double her contribution to village life. Bridget's most notable contribution was as a long-serving Committee member of Privett Village Hall – for many years she served as secretary of the Committee, where her commitment, skill, hard work and dedication served to ensure the success and flourishing of PVH. The complexities of modern life impact even upon a village hall, and Bridget absolutely mastered all the administrative and regulatory issues which are now a feature of the running and management of village halls. She steered PVH through the refurbishment and enlargement of the hall and then through the demands of Covid rules.

Over and above these responsibilities Bridget was the most practical and willing person to have on the PVH Committee – using her considerable handyman skills to deal with maintenance problems; always supporting events; the first to offer to help set up the hall; and the last to leave after checking that all was clean and in order. Everything she did was done with grace and good humour. She worked quietly behind the scenes, always setting herself the highest standards, and never seeking thanks or praise. She was the ideal colleague, and a dear friend.

Having recently stepped down as PVH secretary, Bridget became the secretary of the Froxfield and Privett Village Greening project. Outside the village, Bridget worked hard as a volunteer with a number of charities, including the Samaritans, a homeless charity in Winchester, and the charity Riding for the Disabled.

Bridget and John shared an active interest in trees and woodland, acquiring and managing areas of woodland in Privett and planting a small wood in land they acquired adjoining their house.

In addition, Bridget loved horses and dogs, and was daily seen riding around the lanes exercising them. She was active and fit, with a healthy lifestyle, and so the intensity of her illness and the suddenness of her untimely death came as a real shock and loss – she so obviously still had so much life and zest to offer. Bridget was, in the very best sense, a true steward and servant of the village community in which she made her home. By her life she enriched the lives of others. Appropriately, her life in Privett will be marked in due course by a tree planted as her memorial in the grounds of PVH.

Film Night Plus at Privett - Friday 28 February - The Critic



Our final winter Film Night Plus at Privett is on Friday 28 February (note, again, *Friday*), where we are showing the film *The Critic*, starring a line-up of British acting talent, including the great Ian McKellen, Mark Strong, Lesley Manville, and Gemma Arterton.

The film is in marked contrast to the action and stunt-packed film we showed in November – this is a take on the classic "whodunnit" set in 1930s London, with a devious dark plot. A highly-influential, but malicious, newspaper film critic (McKellen) sets out to destroy the reputation of a young ambitious and glamourous actress, and when the newspaper proprietor tries to sack the film critic, his determination to survive ensures that the other characters are caught in a web of blackmail, deceit and murder.

The Guardian had this to say: "McKellen . . . relishes another devious character to sink his teeth into, devouring every scene, a deliciously caustic turn that will provide him with nothing but the finest notices."

The film has a 15 Certificate.

Before the film we will be serving a supper of Bangers and Mash with Onion Gravy – a nod to the cuisine of that inter-war period. And, of course, a choc ice to follow. There will be a donations bar serving bottled beer and wine.

The evening begins promptly at **7.00pm**, and the film should be finished by 10.00pm at the latest.

Annual Revision of Parish Church Electoral Roll: Important Notice



Each year the parish church updates its electoral roll – this is the list of church members who are entitled to vote at the church's Annual Parochial Council Meeting for the appointment of churchwardens and members of the

parochial church council. (This is quite separate from the electoral roll used for parish council elections, which is maintained by East Hampshire District Council.)

Most importantly, this year we have to make a complete revision of the parish church electoral roll – starting from scratch. So even if you are already on the electoral roll, this year, to remain on the roll, you must complete and return an Application Form.

Application Forms can be found at the back of the church at High Cross, or if you call, text or email me I can send you an Application Form for you to complete.

The parish church electoral roll will be updated on **21 March**, and all Application Forms must be completed and returned by **Wednesday 19 March at the latest**.
