West Meon Music Festival: Rising stars and romantics

The West Meon Music Festival (12th–15th September) brings an opportunity to hear one of today's most exciting young pianists. Lithuanian Gabrielė Sutkutė is the winner of 20 International piano competitions including 1st Prize at the Chappell Medal Piano Competition in 2023 and 2nd Prize and the Audience Prize at the Birmingham International Piano Competition in 2022. She was also the recipient of the prestigious Mills Williams Junior Fellowship in 2022/23.

"We are thrilled to have Gabrielé this year," says the festival's musical director, Andrew Fuller, who is the cellist of the festival's founders, the Primrose Piano Quartet. "She really is a really talented and wonderful performer."

On Sunday 15th September at 11.30am Gabrielé will be performing works by Rameau, Brahms, Debussy and Prokofiev at West Meon's St John's Church on the final morning of the four-day festival.

This year's festival theme is definitely: "Romantic" with concerts featuring nineteenth century German, Viennese and Russian Romantic music by such composers as Beethoven, Brahms, Schubert, and Schumann as well as both Felix and Fanny Mendelssohn.

Earlier music is not forgotten with *Truly Madly Baroque* by Red Priest at All Saints, East Meon at 11.30am on the 14th September. Red Priest has been thrilling audiences with its original take on baroque music for more than 25 years. On Saturday afternoon Purcell and Mozart are not forgotten either with the Primrose's strings performing at Warnford's Church of Our Lady.

Jazz enthusiasts will also want to be at The Thomas Lord in West Meon from 9.30pm on 14th September when local band East of Meon will be performing in aid of The Elizabeth Foundation, a Cosham-based charity that supports pre-school deaf children.

A Cheese and Wine Evening will be held at Privett Village Hall at 7.30 pm on Saturday 11 January.

There will be some entertainment and Ian Hughes will introduce a project that will aim to create a record of the current and recent Privett community.

In Privett Village Hall there are two photographs of the villagers, the first taken in 1977 (at the Queen's Silver Jubilee celebrations in the village) and the second taken in 2000 (to mark the millennium). It is intended to take another village photograph at the Barbeque in July 2020.

The object of the project is to note the names, relationships and addresses of those in the photographs. It would also be interesting to record occupations and personal details of why people moved to the area and what current residents of the village think of life in Privett in the early 21st century.

Any information will be retained solely for the purposes of historical record and subject to the approval of each individual whose details are recorded.

Privett Church Fête and Fun Dog Show – Sunday 11 August

The very best of weather blessed the Privett Church Fête and Fun Dog Show held on the afternoon of Sunday 11 August, and a large crowd came to visit the stalls, enjoy the games and raffle, have tea, cake and Pimms, and, of course enter their dogs in the far-from-serious (but fiercely competitive) dog show. Seeing all the proud dogs wearing rosettes (and their even prouder owners) walking around the Fête, there was something for every sort of dog, and plenty of awards for the judge, Angie Trenchard, to present.

The stalls, festooned with bunting, flowed from the churchyard into the church, and in the bright sunshine everyone enjoyed the refreshments in the shade of the old yews or, even cooler, in the church itself, where Councillor Drew donned an apron to serve tea. On the stall of delicious home-made cakes – well, quite literally, they went like hot cakes! On the Garden Club stall the plants stood firm, but it was the helpers who wilted in the heat, and sizzling (even racy) books were in demand on the book stall. People queued in the burning sun to buy tickets for the classy Raffle prizes – fortunately if you wished to try your hand at bell-ringing you could do so in the shade, and the children, of course, were impervious to the heat as they made crowns for themselves and competed to blow the biggest bubbles, all sparkling in the sunshine.

The purpose of the Fête was to have fun and to raise funds for work on the church bell-tower: Privett Church is held and maintained by the Churches Conservation Trust, a national charity which owns for the nation churches of special architectural merit where those churches are no longer used as a parish church. The CCT has identified that rainwater is entering the bell-chamber and over time will degrade the wooden structure supporting the wonderful set of eight bells in the tower (which were impressively pealing to welcome people to the Fête). The CCT will pay for the necessary work to deal with this, but has asked the village if it can raise some funds to contribute to the costs.

The Fête raised in the order of £1,400, which is a great result, and thanks are most certainly due to Teresa Brown, who inspired and organised the Fête, and the large team of hard-working volunteers who made it all possible.

With still two and a bit weeks to go before the start of the new school year as I write this piece, I can't reflect as usual on the past month's activities in Froxfield CE Primary and Preschool – hopefully all the children and the staff are still enjoying their Summer break and even getting away to have a holiday with their families.

However, I am only too well aware of what the beginning of the upcoming school year in September will mean to many children and parents. I have three grandchildren, one of whom will be entering year 6 this September in his Primary school in Surrey and the youngest, my granddaughter who has just turned 4, will be starting in Reception at her local Primary school in London. For all the oldest and the youngest children in primary schools across the land the beginning of the school year marks a special milestone in the education.

Children going into Year 6 know that suddenly they are the oldest pupils in the school and in Froxfield School this brings with it extra opportunities to show how responsible they can be with being chosen to be prefects and House Sports Captains and 2 very trusted individuals are given the special role of managing the music and the candles in the church for each of the three a week collective worship services. I have observed the pride which the new year 6 children show in their new roles of responsibility and I believe this is just another way in which our school helps to prepare the children to live fruitful and fulfilling lives as active members of their communities.

For children about to join their BIG school in Reception it is also a very important moment in their lives – I'm sure many of us can remember that first day in school and know that it can be both exciting and daunting – for parents as well as the children!

At Froxfield School, the new children coming into the Reception class have had visits to the school and of course a number of them will be coming directly from our excellent preschool so they will be familiar with the building and with their teacher Mrs Ingham Thomas and her class teaching assistant, Mrs Haines. However, despite all the preparation there will still be changes for these small folk to adapt to such as: wearing uniform: changing for PE; remembering to take their book bag home; going to church 3 times a week – and lining up to cross the road in silence (the whole school really does stay silent as they come into church – it's most impressive!)

But above all I know that for all the children coming to Froxfield CE Primary School, either for the first time or returning for another year their time at Froxfield school will be fruitful, fun and set firm foundations for their future as they grow into productive citizens hopefully living out the school's values of Love, Courage and Respect.
