#### **Musical Delights at West Meon**

There will be plenty of musical treats in store this year at the 14th annual West Meon Music Festival (12th to 15th September) with an award-winning planist, a group of world-renowned baroque musicians, and two of the UK's most-talented young string players joining the Primrose Plano Quartet for eight concerts over the four days.

Highlights from the festival include piano quartets by Mozart, Schumann and Brahms as well as a rarely performed piano sextet by Sergei Lyapunov, who fled to Paris after the 1917 Russian revolution, when the quartet will be joined by double bassist Will Duerden and violinist Tom Aldren.

While most concerts are held at West Meon's St John the Evangelist Church, the festival also extends elsewhere into the Meon Valley. Cutting edge baroque quartet Red Priest (named after the original "red priest" – Antonio Vivaldi) have been delighting audiences across the globe since 1997 and will be bringing their unique style of high-energy performances and theatrical presentation to East Meon church on the morning on Saturday 14th September. "Truly Madly Baroque" will explore themes of love, joy and madness. Later in the day the lovely 12th century Church of Our Lady in Warnford is home to a recital by the Primrose's string players of works by Purcell and Mozart.

On Sunday morning (15th September) Lithuanian pianist Gabrielé Sutkuté – winner of some 20 international piano competitions – will be performing works by Rameau, Brahms, Debussy and Prokofiev in West Meon, while that afternoon's festival finale sees the Primrose Piano Quartet focussing on "German Romantics" with works by Felix Mendelssohn, his sister Fanny, Emilie Mayer and Robert Schumann.

In addition there will be a late-night jazz concert by local band, East of Meon, at West Meon's iconic Thomas Lord pub in aid of Cosham-based

Its acclaimed discography includes classical favourites as well as many unjustly neglected works by early twentieth century British composers. Their major commissions include piano quartets written for them by Sir Peter Maxwell Davies and Anthony Payne. The quartet appears regularly in London at Kings Place and the Conway Hall and toured across Europe. The quartet is a leading exponent of historically informed performance and its recording of the complete Brahms piano quartets, made in Vienna on authentic pianos of the period, was highly recommended on Radio 3's "Record Review". Its latest CD of French nineteenth century piano quartets, also using an historic piano, was launched in April 2024.



#### Parish Council News

Russell Oppenheimer reported on some of the current news from Hampshire County Council:

The Government had originally planned to extend Permitted Development Rights to farmers in the National Parks but have recently amended this decision to exclude the National Parks.

Following a winter of poor weather conditions for the roads he felt they were now being improved. The temporary infills, which are 7 times quicker to install, are gradually being replaced with permanent infills. He said the extra £13m which will be coming in from Government will make a difference.

The results from the Future Services Consultation are in the process of being analysed. In the meantime, he felt quite confident that the tip in Petersfield would be kept.

During the May meeting an above average amount of time is spent on the annual finances, which I am pleased to say are in good health.

Planning Application SDNP/24/01295/FUL - 4 Stoner Hill Cottages, Honeysuckle Cottage, Stoner Hill Road, GU32 1DX - Change of use of equestrian land and building to provide parking and residential amenity space. It was resolved to OBJECT to the application on the grounds that it was at odds with SD2, SD4, SD8 and SD11 of the SDNP Local Plan.

Earlier in the year the PC wrote to SSEN regarding the power outages in Privett. This month there have been reports of power cuts in Froxfield. The PC will again be writing to SSEN to ask them to explain the reasons for the power cuts. Nick Drew made a comment that a lack of power was dangerous for the vulnerable. SSEN have published this information to help prepare for the possibility of disruption to supplies by:

- Saving the emergency power cut number '105' to your phone to report any loss of supply or damage to the electricity network
- Visiting our Power Track Website to give you details of power cuts and restoration times. You can also report power cuts and network damage through Power Track.
- Visiting the "Preparing for a power cut" section on our website, where there is a wealth of advice and information, or to chat live to one of our advisors via the Webchat service

Customers are also eligible for our Priority Services Register (PSR) if they:

- Are deaf or hard of hearing
- Have a disability
- Live with children under five
- Are blind or partially sighted
- Have a chronic illness
- Use medical equipment/aids reliant on electricity
- Are over 60.

#### The Churchwarden's Month



A resident of Froxfield or Privett might be forgiven for wondering

"What relevance does the work of a Churchwarden have for me?"

One answer lies in small, but very significant, interventions in protecting churches and land for the use of the community.

The land to the North of the Church at High Cross, in which our most recent burials have taken place, was acquired over 70 years ago.

Half of this land was left to us in the Will of The Baron Willoughby de Broke, in 1951, to be 'in perpetuity part of the church yard " In 1957 the PCC and Church Wardens acquired an adjourning piece of land from the Estate of the late Baron, for the princely sum of £5, with £15 4s 6d costs incurred! A good purchase indeed, especially for the lawyers!

However, in May 2005, the Diocese of Portsmouth wrote to the PCC asking "why they were resisting selling the land to an eager property developer, and giving the proceeds to the Diocese "! The then Churchwardens, the late Admiral Sir Brian Brown, and his redoubtable No.2, Captain Edward (Ted) Hackett, gave them short shrift, a resolution was passed at PCC that we had no intention of selling the land, and that was that !

Today we are using that piece of (consecrated) land for the benefit of anyone who wishes to be buried there in the fulness of time, and has a right to be so. If the churchwardens at that time had not stood their ground......

Churchwardens are required by law to protect the church , and in the 21st Century Lightening Conductors (LC) are inspected every year.

Blissfully unaware of that duty awaiting me in my later years, as a boy, I lived in Bingham, Nottinghamshire, just next to Aslockton, the birthplace of Thomas Cranmer, who became Henry VIII's Archbishop of Canterbury in 1533.

I used to cycle past "Cranmer's cottage " on my way to school. Cranmer knew Bingham Church, and admired its very impressive spire.

It is perhaps a good thing he wasn't alive 200 years later, when on the morning of 21st September 1775 the spire was struck by a lightning bolt.

The only deaths resulting from this were of "13 pigeons and 3 jackdaws, but eleven boys who were in the church were 'thrown down with great violence' and three of them were said to be 'much scorched'. The <u>bells</u> were unharmed, but the <u>clock</u> was damaged, and some stones dislodged from the tower. 0

This story was still being told in Bingham, when the young Froxfield Churchwarden-to-be moved there in 1962, and I've never forgotten it. ......High Cross church is getting its annual LC check on 19 May!

If only the churchwardens in 1775 had had an "Annual Maintenance Checklist " to follow , all may have been well!



Two thirds of the way through May and almost half the year has gone and a moment to reflect on the variety of a Chair of Governor's role.

Children in Year 6 have taken their National Statutory Tests. Each and every one of them did themselves, and the school, proud. You may have heard in the media reports of the test being more challenging this year (particularly the maths), but as I was able to see for myself our pupils approached them with confidence and maturity and all did their absolute best, even if they

found some of the questions difficult. As Chair of Governors one of my roles is to observe the administration of these Statutory Tests on at least one morning - it is interesting to see what lengths Mrs Farrow and Mrs Fry

have to go to in order to comply with the regulations set by the examination board - all scripts kept in a locked cupboard and the key kept in a separate room, the scripts only to be opened in the exam room and all scripts used and unused collected and locked away in new wrappings at the end of the test, but as I can testify they certainly did comply to the letter and I signed to confirm.

I was also interested and impressed to observe how the children conducted themselves during the test I sat in on. Clearly they had been very well prepared for these tests and of course practice in managing themselves under pressure is an important life skill that will stand the children in good stead for their future.

Every year, each of the four classes select a charity to focus on. They learn about the work of the charity and the difference they make. Throughout their time in school, the children will support global, national and local charities including environmental charities, research charities, children's charities and disaster relief charities.

This term, all classes will carry out a fundraising event

for their chosen charity. Class 1 recently held a cake sale in aid of the Petersfield Food Bank. The children designed posters and made cakes, raising £133.35. They also collected dried produce for the food parcels too and I was privileged to deliver these donations which were most gratefully received.

Froxfield School is extremely fortunate to have a close relationship with Bedales and Dunhurst Schools, providing many sporting benefits for the children - for example recently the U9 cricket team played against Dunhurst teams, with the children representing the school so very well.

Over the coming weeks, there are a number of other sporting opportunities planned. As well as cricket, these include football for U11, Teddy Bear Orienteering for Class 1, a Year 2 Small Schools 'Cross Country competition and the Year 5/6 Small Schools 'Swimming Gala. Children love representing their school and the enthusiasm and camaraderie is a delight to witness. Later in June I look forward to the school sports day and handing out the medals and cups to the deserving winners.

As well as chairing the governor meetings with my fellow Froxfield school governors, I currently chair the Small Schools Chairs of Governors Group. This group is made up of the Chairs of governors from the six local schools - Froxfield, West Meon, East Meon, Steep, Sheet and Langrish. It is a very

supportive group and we all value the opportunity to share best practice and to give one another support if needed.

Certainly being a school governor is stimulating, fulfilling, interesting and often lots of fun as well!

#### No Trustees, No Hall!

Our AGM was held on 24 April, to table annual reports from the Chairman and the Treasurer and where all Trustees resign their positions and any volunteers stand for election to Trustee. Our thanks go to the dozen or so members of the Parish who attended the AGM.

Subject to the 2023 Accounts being signed off, the summary financial position is as follows:

\*Capital expenditure included mandatory car park works (a condition of a grant in 2020) and mandatory electrical safety inspection works; together totalling £24k. Provided there are no emergencies, such significant sums should not repeat in 2024, but see the comments below about required maintenance and refurbishment.

The full reports will be made available on the Village Hall website and as usual the approved accounts will be submitted to the Charities Commission. Jenna-Samengo-Turner did not stand for election again, having been a Trustee for many years, providing invaluable support and fulfilling several roles. The Chairman expressed the immense gratitude of all Trustees (past and present) for Jenna's many years of support.

No members of the Parish came forward to volunteer as Trustees, leaving the Council of Management below what is required to run the hall. If this situation doesn't change, Froxfield Village Hall will face the possibility of closure. Robert Shepherd, Dave Rymer and Will Ismay agreed to stand for election again, in order to explore options and develop a plan for the future and if necessary, an orderly transition of the hall.

The Trustees will report back to the Parish at a future public meeting. Sue Clegg also stood for election and joins the committee, with our thanks, to help out with the Bookings role.

The lack of volunteers does mean that there won't be any events organised by the committee, and the £7k raised for the hall through those events in 2023, will not be matched in 2024 unless individuals in the community choose to get together and put them on.

The Trustees at their subsequent meeting agreed to explore options for a simplified fireworks event to try to make it manageable, to put something on for the community and raise some funds in 2024.

The hall still needs significant capital funds to be able to complete necessary repairs, to refit the toilets and kitchen, fix the roof, replace the failing doors and windows and redecorate.

Fundraising is a time-consuming task requiring a scope of work to be developed sufficiently for contractors to price the works. With the contractors' prices, grant applications can be made to organisations like Sport England and The National Lottery, as well as local government.
