

We had a fantastic 2024. A capacity audience enjoyed our Duke Ellington's Sacred Concert in June and after the summer break we prepared for our autumn concert at St Peter's High Cross on 23 November. This was the evening Storm Bert was making its presence felt – especially up here at the top of the hill - but still they came - our loyal and supportive audience. Approximately 85 people left the comfort of their fires and came to listen to us sing. It was a lovely concert and, accompanied by SouthDowns Camerata, Matthew Cooke on the organ and soprano and alto soloists from London, we sang Haydn's Little Organ Mass and Pergolesi's Stabat Mater.

On behalf of Froxfield Choir I would like to say a huge thank you to our band of loyal followers – you are quite simply wonderful and your presence is hugely appreciated. Without your support we would not be able to stage concerts with professional musicians or perform to what we believe to be a high standard.

We hope we will see you in 2025 – we are delighted to have been invited to sing Choral Evensong at All Saints Steep on Sunday 2 March as part of their 900<sup>th</sup> celebration – what an honour. We will then commence rehearsals for our annual concert at Holy Trinity Privett, this year on Saturday 21 June. Accompanied by West Forest Sinfonia we will be singing Brahms' Requiem – it promises to be a great evening.

May we wish you a very happy 2025 and once again, our grateful thanks to you all.

Both very successful community events, with such a large, magnificent space the whole village and friends could attend. 2023 saw the return of our Flower Festival, raising funds for the Church to support the CCT with the Church maintenance.

2024 saw a great deal of activity with more bookings, as well as the annual concert from Froxfield Choir, always a great performance to a packed house.

And what celebrations we had for local residents.

A 50th Wedding Anniversary, the Church beautifully decorated in gold and with the Band with No Name playing.

Dominic and Christie's wedding ceremony, and reception. A beautiful and joyful celebration, with the bells ringing the Bride in and the Bride and Groom out of the Church. An amazing day, a mention in the Daily Mail and Vogue for that one!

Then there was a double 80th Birthday Lunch, with Zulu dancers for entertainment. The bells were commissioned for another 80th birthday, ringing out as the guests were arriving to the party in a local garden. Another hiring was for making a film, and recently a wonderful performance of A Midsummer Night's Dream performed by the very talented This is My Theatre group.

The regular services took place, these being Trinity Sunday Service and the Christmas Carol Service with Frosfield Choir.

# **Privett Church**

#### Privett Church continued

Private bookings are important for generating funds for the general running and upkeep of the Church.

Over the years the wooden bell frame and the bell ropes have been getting damaged by rainwater coming in. We are hoping this will be sorted by directing the water out, rather than pouring in. Of course, this will be a costly maintenance job especially as it requires scaffolding. Money from the commissioned ringing and from donations will be going towards the cost. In 2024 a Fete was held in the Church and Churchyard. Thanks to all the locals running the stalls producing lots of cakes to sell and for refreshments, the total sum raised at the fete was £1450. It was an enjoyable afternoon with a great attendance.

The total raised in 2024 towards these works, is in excess of £3000.

We are pleased that The Privett Centre has had a complete face lift and will a thriving hub for a variety of courses and pop up suppers, run by Amanda from Sage & Season. The centre is also available to hire separately or as an addition to hiring the church. A bonus for the hirers who require, a kitchen, toilets and running water.

#### Reverse Advent Calendar – thank you

At the time of writing this, mid-way through December, we can already see that there has, once again, been an excellent response by way of donations of food and toiletries to the Petersfield Foodbank made through the Reverse Advent Calendar in the church. The steady flow of donations from the village and from Froxfield School has meant that we have made frequent trips to take all the gifts into the Foodbank, where the staff have been very pleased to receive such a wonderful contribution to their Christmas hampers and also for their general stocks – this will help them maintain supplies through the early part of the year. Once again this year we are also grateful to those in the village who have made money transfers directly to the Foodbank\*, or have contributed through the scheme which Howard so generously and willingly operates at the village shop. Cash donations are used by the Foodbank to provide vouchers for buying fresh food in the town.

Throughout the year we keep a box in the church for food donations to the Petersfield Foodbank, so feel free to call in to the church at any time to add to that collection. Or perhaps donate food through Howard's scheme, which also operates throughout the year. Or even consider setting up a monthly money transfer to the Foodbank\* – their bank account details were given in December's Parish Magazine.

## Froxfield Village Hall - Working Party Report

The maintenance working party went ahead as planned on Sunday, 8<sup>th</sup> December in spite of the foul weather and a power outage.

In all we had responses from 31 people regarding volunteering, although quite a few couldn't make it this time due to other commitments, 13 people attended for anything between 1 and 4 hours.

Jobs tackled included: -

- Reposition and pin ceiling tiles
- Clean windows inside and out
- Repaint porch ceiling
- Prep surface in kitchen and bar for painting
- Tile bar sink
- Replace kitchen door stop and repair damaged wall
- Refit clear screen in front of servery/bar
- Straighten up kitchen cabinet doors
- Bulb planting along the south side of hall should look wonderful in the spring

Travis Perkins kindly sponsored materials, including paint, brushes and safety equipment. A big thank you to Richard McKee, Petersfield branch manager, for being so helpful with organising this.

General feedback was that this was a success, both for getting maintenance work done for the hall and also as a social meeting for the community. Much tea, coffee, cake and many bacon sandwiches were consumed.

It was agreed amongst the volunteers that this should be repeated on a monthly basis and that the second Sunday of each month was suitable.

Today I attended the school's annual Nativity Service in St Peter's High Cross. As ever I was left feeling moved by the retelling of the birth of Christ in the stable more than 2000 years ago, by the way this age old and so familiar story unfolds before the congregation of eager parents and grandparents - those watching their tiny child in the preschool make their first entrance onto a stage and those whose child has grown old enough now to take on one of the traditional speaking parts - Mary, Joseph, the Angel Gabriel, a wise man, even the Donkey - all the grownups anxious to see and hear the tale. Today's congregation was so well rewarded by this latest, excellent performance by all the children of Key stage 1 of Froxfield CE Primary and Preschool.

The play was opened by the children from the preschool - who range from age 2 to 4 years old - they sang and signed with Maketon Sign Langauge "We wish you a Merry Christmas". It was wonderful to see the confidence and joy these very small people had in singing so clearly in front of the chancel steps - I was standing at the back of the church, and I could hear every word.

Confidence and joy remained a theme of the whole production, from the outstanding narrators telling the story from the pulpit, the glittering angels, the grumpy innkeepers, the frightened shepherds and their sheep, the magnificently dressed wise men, to Mary, Joseph and their loyal donkey - everyone played their part with such confidence, conviction and obvious delight.

Meanwhile hidden from view but nonetheless completely engaged in the performance, were all of the Key Stage 2 children, whose lovely singing from behind the stage rang all around the church. They sang out the Christmas message of peace and love embodied in the baby Jesus - soothing balm to adult ears in these troubling times across the world.

As well as learning lines and when their cue is, there is so much invaluable learning taking place when children are involved in a school production like the one we saw today. The participants develop the confidence to speak up, to speak so their voice can be heard; they learn to manage their nerves; to work collaboratively - understanding that everyone's role, greater or smaller, contributes to the success of the whole.

In Collective Worship last half-term, the children were thinking about the value of generosity. They talked about what it means to be generous with their time, actions and words and they linked this to the generosity shown by the innkeeper in the Nativity story. They also talked about showing generosity through donating to the needy in our local society via the contributions being made to the Petersfield Foodbank via the Reverse Advent Calendar. My husband Rob and I regularly collect the donations and deliver them to the food bank. The volunteers at the food bank have been so touched by the generosity of everyone and ask us to pass on their thanks to all who have contributed to this good cause.

School still has a week to go before the end of term and the staff will have just 4 days to get ready for their Christmas - on behalf of all the governors I'd like to wish everyone who makes Froxfield School such a special place a very happy, peaceful and joyful Christmas.
