Poppy Collection In Froxfield And Privett - 2024



With door-to-door collection becoming more difficult, last year we trialled a hub system, which seemed very successful, and which we will repeat this year.

There will be a number of collection hubs where the Froxfield and Privett community can buy poppies. These

hubs will be:

Froxfield Drive – Kate Adams – in her absence a door-to-door collection on 26 and 27 October.

Froxfield Green – Jane de Halpert will host the hub.

Fawley Farm Feeds, Fawley Farm, Privett

The Old Dairy Tea Room, Fawley Farm, Privett

The Trooper and White Horse/No Name – as before.

Froxfield School – restricted to supporting staff and students, as before.

High Cross and Froxfield Green **churches** – will have poppy boxes available in November services.

Thus we will have about 7 static hubs within easy reach of residents for all to contribute to the Poppy Collection. Please support this arrangement.

The start date for the collection will be 21 October, and the Annual Remembrance service will be at Froxfield Green on Sunday 10 November.

The Parish & Village School "Reverse Advent Calendar" this December

Once again, in the run up to Christmas, the parish and the village school are setting up in the church a Reverse Advent Calendar in order to provide festive food and also essentials for the PACT Foodbank in Petersfield. The demands made on the Foodbank are as great as ever, both throughout the year and especially at Christmas time, when household budgets in some families are especially under pressure.

The idea is simple but forgive us for reminding you once again how this works: in a reverse of the usual idea of an Advent Calendar (opening a "window" in the calendar for each day of December and taking a gift) you bring a gift and put it in the calendar for that day. The "calendar" in this instance is a display in the church of carrier bags, each marked with a day of the month and the particular gift for that day – boxes of mince pies; chocolate; tins of soup; Christmas puddings; nuts; toothpaste; shampoo; stollen and other goodies for Christmas plus essentials for everyday life.

This December we will be opening up once more the Reverse Advent Calendar, again as a joint endeavour by Froxfield School and the parish, and all are encouraged and truly welcomed to make donations to the Calendar. As in previous years, children from Froxfield School will be visiting the Foodbank to see for themselves how the Foodbank operates, and the nature and extent of its work in our area.

From the end of November, the 24 large bags will be set out at the back of the church (the church is open every day from 8.30am to 5pm), and you can bring your gifts whenever it suits you. In December's Parish Magazine we will list the days of the month and the gifts for each day, but there is no rule about this – come when you can and all the bags will remain available throughout the month. Please note that the bags will be emptied very regularly to reduce the risk of theft.

Some may prefer to make a cash donation to the work of the PACT Foodbank, and in December's Parish Magazine we will give details of how you can do that by cheque or online.


We haven't had an action-packed film before, but this, with a RomCom background, is classy and entertaining. It has a 12A certificate, so kids should enjoy it, too.

Clergy Corner: A moment of History

You may have heard the whisper of a momentous anniversary in our neighbouring community that is fast approaching.

Just 59 years after William the Conqueror landed on England's south coast, the community of Steep began a new spiritual journey. In 1125 the first part of a church building was started, giving the village its own place of worship. Here began the gradual development of All Saints into the building that we know and love today.

Then, as now, this became the site of family and community celebrations, of important life-rituals marking births, marriages and deaths. Where they had needed to journey the difficult miles to East Meon, parishioners could now gather to express their Christian faith in their own village.

As in Froxfield and Privett, Steep church has always sought to make a positive difference in the heart of its community, reflecting the world-changing love of God that Jesus shows us. Through our life, worship and actions we hope that the 900th anniversary year will refresh that vision, welcoming everyone, young and old(er!) to step into their shared history and beyond, and to experience God's life and love for themselves.

On Sunday 3rd November we celebrate the festival of All Saints at Steep, after which the church is named. What better day to launch the anniversary year for Steep Church? At our Benefice Service at 10am on that day the Bishop of Portsmouth will be our guest speaker, and a new piece of music by Jonathan Willcocks has been commissioned to be sung as part of the service. Everyone is invited to this very special occasion.

Look out for opportunities throughout the next twelve months to celebrate – to enjoy concerts and other events, and to discover more about the part that All Saints Church has played in Steep's life over the past 900 years, and what it means to us all.

On the subject of Spring bulbs, Members were reminded that one of the classes in the Spring Show for 2025 is 5 Miniature Daffodils in a pot no more than 15cm (6") diameter so we need to get planting in order that we have lots of entries in this class. 
"Walking Wednesdays".

These applications have been discussed by the Parish Council or the Planning Committee this month.

SDNP/24/03717/FUL Land North of Barnet Side Cottage, Barnet Side Lane, Froxfield, Petersfield, Hampshire, Change of use for the stationing of a temporary mobile home for a period of three years to be used in conjunction with the charcoal making and forestry business. It was resolved to SUPPORT the application

SDNP/24/02880/TCA Holy Trinity Privett Three self seeded sycamore trees - Fell. Yew Tree 1 - Crown Reduction - Existing height 8 metres, proposed height 8 metres. Existing spread 5 metres proposed spread 4 metres. Yew Tree 2 - Crown Reduction Existing height 6 metres, proposed height 6 metres. Existing spread 3 metres, proposed spread 2 metres. It was resolved to OBJECT to the proposals. On the grounds that this is the fifth application for tree works since 2017 and whilst it is appreciated that tree management is necessary to preserve the church surrounds, the trees which are the subject of this application are positioned on or around the front boundary and cannot be considered to be having an adverse impact upon the grounds.

SDNP/24/03968/FUL Thatchers Farm, Warren Lane, Froxfield, Petersfield, Hampshire, GU32 1BJ Replacement dwelling with associated landscaping together with the consolidation of the existing scrap yard business with associated landscaping. It was agreed to OBJECT to the proposals

At the time of going to press, the yellow flashing signs outside the school at High Cross are still not working due to a delay with the electrical supply connection.

The yellow lines at High Cross were discussed at the October meeting but a final decision would be made until the information collected from other parties has been carefully considered.

Councillor Oppenheimer reported on several county matters. He was pleased to have returned to HCC's Cabinet as Executive Member for Health and Wellbeing. He is looking forward to working with the Public Health team and the NHS to make it easier for people to get healthy and stay healthy He thanked Cllr Rob Mocatta for working hard to prevent the closure of Petersfield Tip. He had discussed with the executive member the speeding issues on C18. His full report can be read on the parish council website.

Village Greening:

Reaching out to our villages on how we can become carbon neutral

Since the launch of Village Greening last year there has been steady progress and some positive developments over recent months. The screening of the uplifting film 2040 was a great success with around

50 villagers turning out to watch - many commented that they felt inspired by the film as to what can be achieved.

Since then, a successful fundraising event - the 'Midsummer Bash' - was held at Privett Village Hall. It was a great evening, enjoyed by all who attended.

This, along with a small grant from EHDC via Councillor Nick Drew, has provided a boost of funds for the movement.

Village Greening continued

Later in the summer an excellent training presentation was conducted by Stuart Mills of Energy Alton on the topic of energy efficiency, the retrofitting of insulation and other energy saving measures. Several Village Greening members plus a few other interested locals attended and we now feel better equipped to discuss those issues with people needing help with their energy consumption.

Village Greening is now considering its next step forward - a Future Energy Landscape (FEL) exercise for the parish. Information explaining what this is can be found at: https://www.cse.org.uk/my-community/community-projects/future-energy-landscapes-community-consultation-method/. This community-wide initiative will probably cost about £5,000 to operate so donations are still being sought to help with this.

We'd love to have more villagers join this important initiative and believe that a plan for the villages' transition away from carbon energy is essential. That plan needs real local support. So far local involvement has been stronger in Privett than in Froxfield. Please come along and help us ensure that our villages remain not only beautiful and comfortable but also do their bit for carbon reduction and energy transition.

Taking action locally can help everyone globally.

Encouraging the children to keep fit is something that Froxfield school takes very seriously and despite the lack of a bespoke gym the children participate in a wide range of sports and the school has a great record of success in team sports and in cross country running. Recently the children in years 3, 4, 5 and 6 enjoyed participating in the Portsdown Hill Cross Country League for the 2.4km hill run – this is an event that lots of children from across the county join and there were 155 girls and 185 boys on the two start lines. All the Froxfield children ran brilliantly, and the girls' team came an amazing 4th overall. A special mention must also go to Tom Masters, one of our Year 6 boys who came 3rd in the boys' race. I'm sure that the golden mile that all the children take part in at school – even the children in the preschool - really benefits the children's fitness and their enjoyment of sport.

The school held its harvest Festival service in St Peter's High Cross at the beginning of the month and some children in year 5 and 6 helped to put together the wonderful display of fruit and vegetables at the foot of the altar. The children in Class 2 led the service – speaking out clearly and with great confidence and the very well attended service was a joyful occasion. Parents of children from across the whole school donated most generously a range of tinned and packet food and I felt very proud of Froxfield School when I delivered 6 bulging, large, carrier bags to the Petersfield Foodbank the following day.

In case you're wondering what happened to the fruit and vegetables they were all auctioned off by Alex Matcham – a school parent - at the end of the following Saturday's Messy Church session which Katherine Matcham had organised – although Messy Church is open to all there were a great number of Froxfield school children and parents enjoying harvest crafts, songs and prayers.

As well as writing gratitude notes on coloured leaves to hang on the Gratitude Tree - which is now in St Peter's church - feel free to add your own leaf with its message of thanks for what you might feel especially grateful. There is a basket with extra leaves for anyone to write on next to the tree.

I was glad to be able to chat to some of the parents of the new children in Reception the other afternoon – it was very reassuring to hear how delighted they all are with how well their child is settling into school life and how happy they are with Froxfield as their chosen school.
